The Matrix Small Group Readings

The film *The Matrix* offers many opportunities for philosophical investigation. The film explores metaphysical questions of ontology and determinism; epistemological questions regarding truth; and ethical questions about the value of experience. You will investigate a specific question as it relates to *The Matrix*. You will be assigned a reading and will be placed in a discussion group. Upon meeting with your group, you will present your reading to your group members and lead a discussion based on your respective article.

Your assignment is explained as follows.

1) You will be assigned one of the following readings:

Skepticism, Morality and the Matrix by G. J. Erion and Barry Smith The Metaphysics of the Matrix by Jorge J.E. Gracia and Jonathan J. Sanford The Machine-Made Ghost by Jason Holt Neo-Materialism and the Death of the Subject by Daniel Barwick Fate, Freedom and Foreknowledge by Theodore Schick Jr.

- 2) After you have thoroughly read your piece, you will create a clear and organized summary (two pages) for distribution to a small group of peers. The handout will contain:
 - a. An introduction: Provide a general overview of the essay.
 - b. The thesis of the article. What is the paper trying to say?
 - c. The support for this thesis. What are the arguments for this point?
 - d. Major conclusions. What conclusions can be made from this argument?
 - e. Discussion questions and prompts for your group discussion.

Please note that your content and layout should reflect a sense of audience: the handout should be user friendly with appropriate layout/spacing; font choice should be easy to read and size should be 12 pt; graphics may be used. The header should include your name, date, title of reading and course code.

- 3) After you have completed your reading and handout you will meet with your small group and lead a discussion based on your reading and handout. Be sure to thoroughly explain your reading before you begin your discussion as your group members will not be familiar with your paper.
- 4) You will be assessed as per the attached assessment form.
